Winterfest 2005

It is time to start getting excited about **Winterfest 2005**, the 11th Annual Northeast NTRAK Convention, January 28-30, 2005. The convention will once again be held in conjunction with the annual "Big Railroad Hobby Show" of the Amherst Railway Society at the Eastern States Exposition grounds, "The Big E", in West Springfield, MA on January 29-30. This is undoubtedly the largest model railroad show in New England with 3 buildings full of layouts, exhibits, manufacturers and dealers. The show usually attracts an attendance of more than 20,000. Winterfest 2005 will feature model, module, and photo contests, informative clinics, full capacity layout operations (including DCC), and a memorable Saturday evening banquet.

Our convention hotel again this year is the new **Hilton Garden Inn** which is centrally located just off Interstate 91 in downtown Springfield. The hotel, located at 800 West Columbus Avenue, is across the side street from the Basketball Hall of Fame and only minutes from "The Big E" and Springfield's AMTRAK station. A **convention rate of just \$79.00** (\$6 less than last year) plus tax (currently 12.45%) per night has been negotiated, single **or double** occupancy. There will be a charge of \$10.00 per night for each additional guest in the room. Children eighteen and under may stay free when sharing a room with an adult using existing bedding. The charge for a rollaway bed (must be reserved in advance) is \$15.00 per night. **Hotel reservations should be made before January 5, 2005** by calling **413-886-8000** or **800-774-1500**. Please identify yourself as a member of **NTRAK** to get the special convention rate. After January 5, 2005, hotel reservations will be accepted on a space and rate availability basis only so don't procrastinate. There is ample free parking at the hotel for registered guests.

Winterfest 2005 registration materials will be snail mailed shortly to previous attendees without a web address on file and will also become available one day later on our website at www.NortheastNTRAK.org. It is much

preferred that you register online. **Full registration for Winterfest 2005 is \$25.00 but only \$20.00 if you register before January 1, 2005.** This covers registration for you and your spouse plus your children under the age of 16. Older children and other adult family members must register separately.

The Better Living Center building of "The Big E" will be open after 12:00 P.M. on Friday for layout setup activities. Those who do not bring modules but plan to run trains should also plan to share in the fun of meeting and working with new and old friends to set up and test the layout. Please try to have all modules in place, clamped, and connector tracks installed before 5:00 P.M. Friday. Please read the article titled "**Winterfest 2005 Layout Operation**" in last month's newsletter for more details.

The hotel will be available after 3:00 P.M. for check-in. The Convention Registration Desk will open at 7:00 P.M. in the hotel conference room area just off the main lobby. A series of entertaining and informative clinics will begin at 7:30 P.M.

Again this year, there is a charge for parking at "The Big E" but you may **purchase a parking hangtag for \$5.00** (\$1.00 less than last year, **valid Saturday and Sunday**) as part of your Winterfest 2005 registration.

Everyone at the banquet will receive a festive **British pint drinking glass** with the Winterfest logo printed in orange as a change from the traditional blue imprinted coffee mugs. Extra British pint drinking glasses will be available at \$5.00 each while the supply lasts. New this year will be an opportunity to purchase a **commemorative Winterfest 2005 T-shirt for just \$12.00**. The Winterfest logo will be printed in orange on the front of a light gray shirt. Shirts must be ordered and the size (S through XXL) must be chosen prior to January 1, 2005 as part of the advanced registration process. The shirts will then be printed and handed out at the convention

Refrigerated Railroad Cars By: Dennis Yip

Railroad cars have been transporting our daily essentials food groups in refrigerated cars for many years, but truly when did it all begin? Well, since the beginning of the 1840's refrigerated cars were used to transport only milk and butter. The country could not enjoy fresh produce and other foods from other states at the time because the invention of an efficient refrigerated car was not invented yet. It would be twenty-seven years later, when J.B Sutherland of Detroit, Michigan would patent an efficient refrigerated car. He designed an insulated car with ice bunkers in each end. Air came in on the top, passed through the bunkers and circulated through the car by gravity, controlled by the use of hanging flaps that changed the air temperature. With his new invention mid-Western cities that lacked resources could be established.

The increasingly widespread distribution of fresh foods expanded markets and helped people's diets of meat, eggs, produce, butter, milk, cheese, and fish. Parker Earle of Illinois would also invent the same year, the first refrigerated car that carried fresh fruit as well. His car carries 100 pounds of ice and 200 quarts of strawberries, and ran over the Illinois Central Railroad. This would be the beginning of how refrigeration on railroad cars started in America.

The Double Slip Solution

In the early days of Ntrak, the show coordinator was happy to get any modules for a show. Many minor and some major deviations from the "specs" were usually winked at and the module went into the layout anyway. Compare this with the recent Chantilly convention where modules were subjected to detailed inspections by the module police.

I remember one very early Long Island Ntrak show where a quick inspection of the module showed that there were double slip switches on the yellow and blue lines. We're not talking about the newer, more reliable Peco switches that are now available. These double slips were state-of-the-non-art and were capable of derailing any and all cars and locomotives that dared to pass through them.

The owner of the module had a brilliant solution to the problem--he used re-railers as connecting tracks at both ends of his modules to re-rail wheels as they passed by--assuming that they could make it that far while bouncing along the ties. But another Ntraker came up with an even better solution.

Sometime during the course of the show, while the owner was elsewhere and unknowing, the points of all of these double slip switches were carefully and permanently soldered into the through track alignments. Things ran much better after that. When the module owner discovered the "repair", we all gave him shoulder shrugs and blank looks. "Really. Oh gee, look at that. No, I didn't see a thing."

Registration Desk on Friday at 7:00 PM.

On Saturday morning convention activity will shift to "The Big E". Please arrive early and help with track cleaning and final testing so a full set of long trains will be rolling when the doors burst open at 9:00 A.M. Be sure to help fill all the slots on the sign up sheets for 3 trains on the Blue Line, 3 trains on the Yellow Line, and 3-5 trains on the Red Line (DCC), 1 Layout/Supervisor/Helper and 3 Throttle-Tower Operators for each hour of operation. Model Contest and Photo Contest entries will be received from 8:00 to 10:00 A.M.. We will have model and photo contest entry forms that can be filled out online and printed for each of your entries. We will also have paper copies of the forms at the registration desk. Train operation at the layout will continue all day and will include the "Parade of Trains" best-train-in-show competition to be held from 2:00 to 3:00 P.M. Note that **voting in the model, module, and photo contests must be completed before 3:00 P.M.**

Saturday evening activities at the convention hotel will begin at 6:30 P.M. with an "Attitude Adjustment Hour" featuring a cash bar, hot hors d'oeuvres and a digital slide show. The banquet this year will feature a tossed garden salad with dressing, your choice of sliced grilled London broil with a mushroom cabernet sauce or breast of chicken with apple bread stuffing, potato and vegetable, rolls and butter, and dessert. Water, coffee or specialty teas will be served with the meal. The cash bar will remain open for the duration of the banquet so you can fully test your British pint glass. The **price for the banquet and appetizers** (stuffed mushrooms, sesame chicken and a mixed cheese plate), plus an entertaining guest speaker, contest awards presentation, up-dates from manufacturers, and exceptional camaraderie is just **\$30.00 per person**. A special meal is available for children under 12 for \$13.00.

On Sunday the focus returns again to "The Big E" for more excitement and team effort to keep the layout operating at full capacity. Of course shopping and seeing the rest of the show is always an option. **Model and photo contest entries should be picked up after 3:00 P.M. on Sunday.** Layout takedown and tearful farewells will wrap-up the convention activities after the show closes at 5:00 P.M.

We encourage you to spruce up your best modules and enter them in the module contest. Layout space is somewhat limited, so if you are planning to bring a module, please contact the **Layout Coordinator, John Dunne, at 508-697-7635** as soon as possible to reserve your space. We plan to run DCC (Digitrax) on the Red Line so bring your DCC equipped motive power and your radio throttle if you have one.

In summary, save the dates for Winterfest 2005; make your hotel reservations now; find a friend to share your room to save yourself some money; fill out your registration materials promptly when they become available soon; finish up those potential prize winning models for the model contest; decide on your best train to run in the "Parade of Trains" contest; print and frame that great picture you took recently (no repeats from previous years please); start packing a variety of trains to help keep the layout running at capacity; and then get totally psyched to help make Winterfest 2005 a really fun time for everyone!
